UNEMPLOYMENT

Utah's unemployment held steady at 2.0% in August, tied for the 2nd lowest in the country. Additionally, Utah remains one of 18 states to add jobs over 2019 levels, up 6.2% as of July, the second highest in the nation.

ONE-YEAR CENSUS ESTIMATES

According to recently released 1-year U.S. Census estimates, **Utah experienced an annual population increase of 1.7% in 2021, the second highest in the nation.** Over 3.3M people now live in the state, with most of the population living in the Salt Lake City region.

HOME PRICES DECLINE SLIGHTLY

For the first time in over two years of unprecedented home value growth, Utah experienced its first month-over-month decline in July at -0.7%. However, demand for housing in the state remains high and July's price decline was among the most minimal in the country.

RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION

According to a recent report, Utah's housing construction value experienced a 5.1% decline in the first half of 2022, adjusted for inflation. However, construction value remained 55% higher than 2019 levels at \$4.5B.

INTERNATIONAL GROWTH

SLC experienced a robust resurgence in international travel this past summer. Markets that had notably more passengers this summer than in 2019 included, Mexico beach markets, Amsterdam, Paris, Frankfurt, Guadalajara and London.
