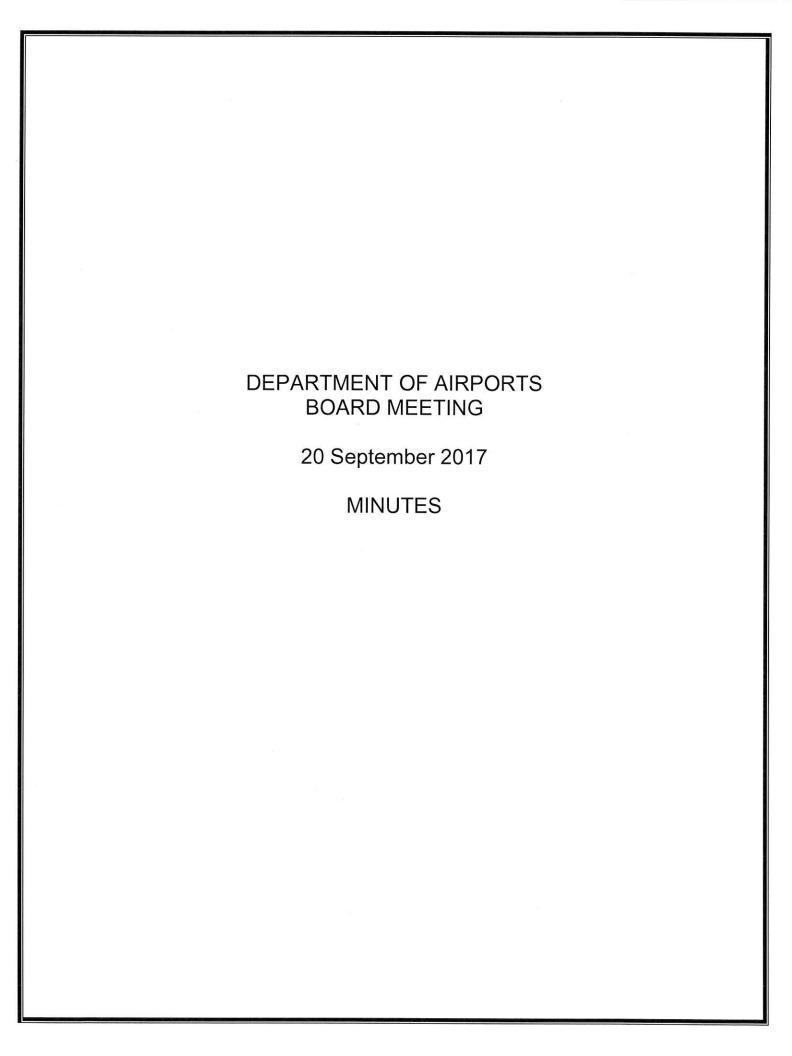

Larry Pinnock called the meeting to order at 8:08 am.

#### AGENDA

#### A. Minutes

The motion was made by Igor Best-Devereux and seconded by Natalie Gochnour to approve the minutes of May 17 and June 21, 2017 as presented. All votes were affirmative; motion passed.

#### B. Director's Report

Russ Pack, Executive Director, updated the Airport Advisory Board regarding current events.

- Pack stated that the budget for the North Concourse continues to be refined. Changes to
  the project scope require evaluating the costs for the potential impacts on the CPE and the
  terms of the debt coverage. The Airport is currently in the early stages of evaluating the
  new costs and as we move forward through the process we will keep the Board apprised.
  Met with Delta last week on potential impacts to the CPE as a result of project scope
  changes. Delta was entirely unconcerned and requested that the program be accelerated.
- Pack informed the Board that City and Airport staff have been meeting to discuss the Northwest Quadrant (NWQ) Master Plan. Next month, Lara Fritts, Director of Economic Development, will present an update on the NWQ to the Board.
- Pack stated that Clear has launched and during the first 19 days there have been 760 completed enrollments, 421 partial and nearly 6,640 verifications for an average of 370 applications completed per day.
- Pack updated the Board regarding gate usage and the impact that increasing passenger counts along with new service has had on the Airport. Gates D10 and D12 may be taken out of service for construction phasing. Backup plans could include a possible hard stand operation. To accommodate hard stand operations the Airport has purchased three COBUS infield shuttle buses and are evaluating options for a temporary hold room. Biggest concern is the public perception that a hard stand operation is a diminished level of service. The hard standing operation is understandable but there is the need to make the general public aware.
- Pack stated that last Friday night an A330 came in with an engine problems. The flight
  had 318 passengers on board enroute from Barcelona to Oakland when the aircraft had
  engine problems. The aircraft required a hardstand operation. The property staff and
  operations staff processed the passengers through customs quickly, found food for them
  and found rooms to accommodate them for the night.
- Airports Council International (ACI) announced the 2017 Director General's Airport Service Quality Roll of Excellence inductees. The ACI Director General's Roll of Excellence identifies airports that have been ranked in the top five airports by size or region for five of the last six years, in the ASQ Survey, that have consistently delivered excellence in customer service. Salt Lake City received this prestigious award.
- Pack acknowledged Dave Teggins, Operations Manager, for his efforts and leadership during a recent double fatality accident that occurred outside Butterfield Canyon. The student's family was located at South Valley Regional Airport waiting for the student and pilot to return, when the accident occurred. Routinely the staff at South Valley Regional take on Chaplaincy role during events of this nature. Dave took the family into a safe area, contacted family members and assisted with their needs. Pack thanked Dave for a job well done.
- Pack recognized Dave Tingey, Ryan Richard, Chris Kontgis, LaMar Stuart, and Tony
  Mitchell for their job in maintaining the grounds at the Airport. Pack acknowledged how
  difficult this year has been with the past winter, extremely hot summer, and the
  construction project. Pack commented on the how lovely the sustainable landscaping was
  maintained.

Pinnock asked if the NWQ Master Plan addresses the issue of the Airports additional runway. Pack answered that it did but there was a hesitancy early on with the general fund to include the runway in the program because they were concerned about some push back from the environmental community. Russ commented that the issue needs to be addressed in a straight

forward fashion and show it as future airport development. The NWQ Master Plan also included a portion of airport fund property within a conservation easement. Currently the Airport is working on correcting that. If not corrected it would be codified into a conservation area and later would need to be undone. Pack stated that this sort of question would be great to ask Lara Fritts when she presents to the Board next month.

Best-Devereux requested an update regarding the amendment to the ground transportation ordinance that regulated fares. Historically the amendment needed to be renewed every six months. Pack answered that there was a meeting scheduled for today with Marco Kunz to discuss moving forward to make this permanent. The Airport is proposing having the amendment go to the City Council for review and approval to make it permanent. The changes will make the temporary language to permanent language.

J.T. Martin arrived at the meeting at 8:13 am.

Patrick Leary arrived at the meeting at 8:15 am.

Martin asked Dave Tingey if he had a wish list of things that would make his life better, what they would be. Tingey answered that staffing is challenging, demand on equipment can be difficult to coordinate, and getting more education and professional training for staff.

Leary updated the Board regarding the Executive Director's search. Leary stated that he will be reaching out to a number of folks to help with that initial screening. The search is well underway and there is a good applicant pool. The first round of interviews will be scheduled in the next couple of weeks.

Leary stated he and the Mayor had an opportunity to meet with Delta's representatives to celebrate Delta's 30 year anniversary. The meeting with Ed Bastian and his staff went well and we will be looking for an update for this Board over the next month or two.

#### C. Terminal Redevelopment Program Update

Mike Williams, Terminal Redevelopment Program (TRP) Director, presented an update on the TRP (presentation on file). Main points included were:

- CGMP #4 Landside and Airside Enabling status
- CGMP #5 Terminal/South Concourse West/Gateway status
- CGMP #6 Roadways/Parking Garage/Central Utility Plant status
- CGMP #7 Baggage Handling System status
- CGMP #9 Apron Paving Taxilane 20/21
- North Concourse Project status
- Overall program construction and paving sequence
- Near term schedule
- Overall capital program costs

Senator Mayne left the meeting at 8:35 am.

Pinnock asked if on the revised scope for the North Concourse additional gates were included. Williams answered that the additional 15 gates were not included in the revised scope.

Best-Devereux asked if consideration to incorporate solar panels had been considered in the design of the North Concourse or was the design a replica of the South Concourse. Williams answered that the design was replicating the South Concourse. We evaluated a couple of options in solar panels for the South and the return was not there for the buildings. The infrastructure to support PV panels was added to the parking garage because of the expanse of the deck.

Natalie Gochnour asked how the 59% of local contractor versus the 41% out-of-state contractors compared to other airport locations Williams had previously worked at. Williams stated that the Airport has done well. If you look at the percentages it looks a lot closer but if you look at the number of contracts we have awarded a lot of work has been awarded to the local community.

Mickey Gallivan wondered what the conversation is at UTA about meeting the present design for the elevated TRAX line coming into the Airport. Leary answered that a meeting is scheduled for tomorrow to discuss the issue.

Martin inquired on how the switch from the old Park and Wait lot to the new location was going. Williams answered that currently it was going well. Nancy Volmer stated that she has not received a lot of comments but there will be a learning curve to get people educated on the change.

Martin requested additional signage be added in the Park and Wait on how to exit. Williams answered that there is another exit that is blocked off because of the convenience store construction. Once construction is done there will be additional overhead signs on the roads. Currently the Airport is working with UDOT to place a sign off airport property. Pack stated that the operation will get cleaned up once construction is complete.

Martin inquired if a portable restroom could be installed in the Park and Wait lot. Williams answered that the Airport could look into the request but there were not restroom facilities in the previous lot.

Martin asked how the information board located in the Park and Wait lot was populated. Williams answered that it is a feed from the Flight Information Display System (FIDS) in the airport. Ed Cherry stated the information is provided by airlines.

#### D. Transportation Security Administration (TSA) Update

Mark Lewis, Federal Security Director, TSA, presented an update regarding the TSA. Main points included were:

- Currently the TSA is fully staffed and approximately 450 are employed at the Salt Lake City Airport. Adjustments needed for seasonal increases will be covered with overtime.
- The longest wait time recorded this summer while going through the screening check points was 25 minutes. Normally the wait times average much lower. Passengers going through the checkpoint from January 1 through July 30, 2016 totaled 4.1 million. For

January 1 through July 30, 2017 the number was 4.6 million. Which equates to about 2,200 more passengers per day. Wait times have not increased significantly even with the increase in passengers.

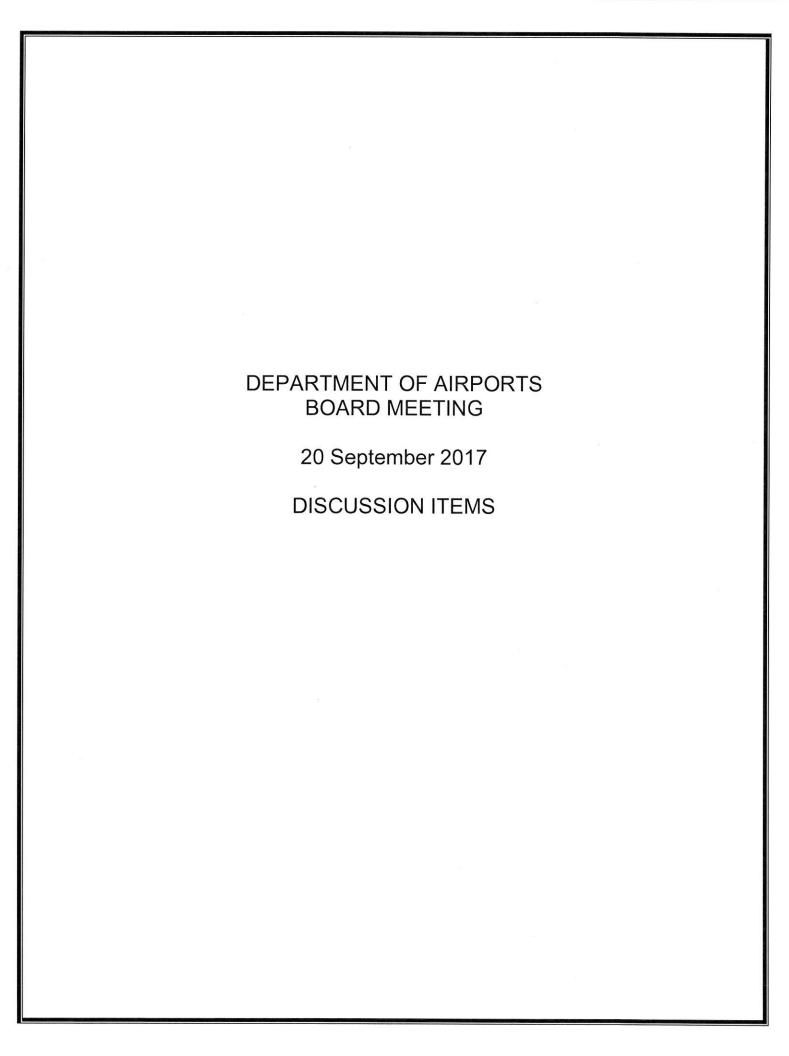
- The canine teams were established a little over a year ago and have helped the TSA become more efficient. Currently the TSA has four canine teams located at Salt Lake City. Two are new dogs going through the process of getting certified. They are trained in explosive detection and when the dogs work they are very effective.
- Last week the media announced that the TSA is implementing new screening procedures at the check point. The new procedures will be implemented at all airports but airports are implementing on different timelines. Salt Lake City will be changing by the end of the year. Passengers will have to divest anything electronic and larger than a cell phone.
- No current direction on mandating 100% employee screening. However at this airport,
  Delta has made significant investments to do 100% employee screening. Have
  participated in discussions with TRP and Airport on how to transition and implement to
  the new screening locations and on the plans for the new terminals for possible future
  mandates.

Best-Devereux stated that he heard another news report regarding a passenger with a loaded firearm trying to go through screening. Are there any lessons learned from these events or any changes to protocol that could be implemented? Could additional signage be added that would help deter some of the events? Lewis answered that when a gentlemen at the checkpoint had a gun with him and was asked if he didn't see the sign, he answered that he saw the sign but forgot he had the gun. That's usually what has happened they have forgot they had the gun with them. The potential fine is up to \$7,500 for the first event.

Gochnour raised a concern regarding the staffing in the International Terminal being insufficient when deplaning passengers go through customs. There has been an increase of 33% in international travelers but not an increase in staff. Gochnour stated that the lines after an international flight are too long. Lewis answered that over the years several discussions have been over this particular issue. It is a challenging issue and the TSA do not get staff allocations for that terminal. The TSA is coming up on the allocations review for this coming year and currently have calls into headquarters regarding the international terminal staffing needs.

The next Board meeting will be held on September 20, 2017.

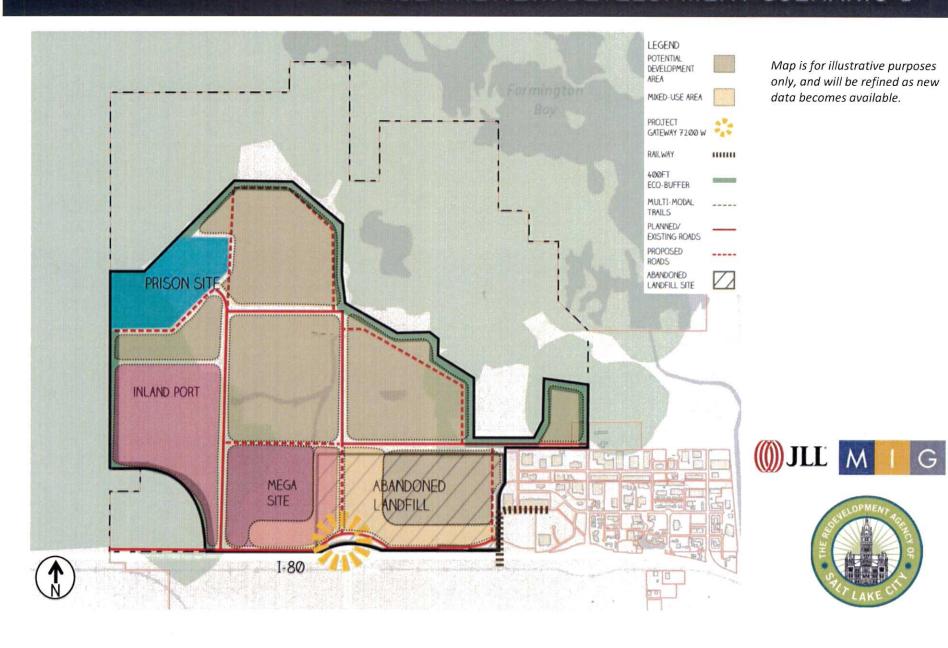

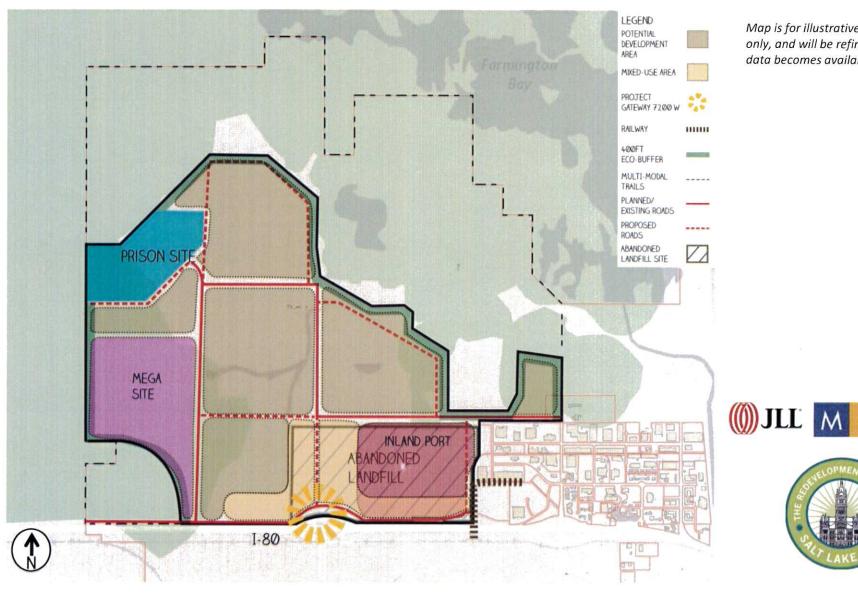

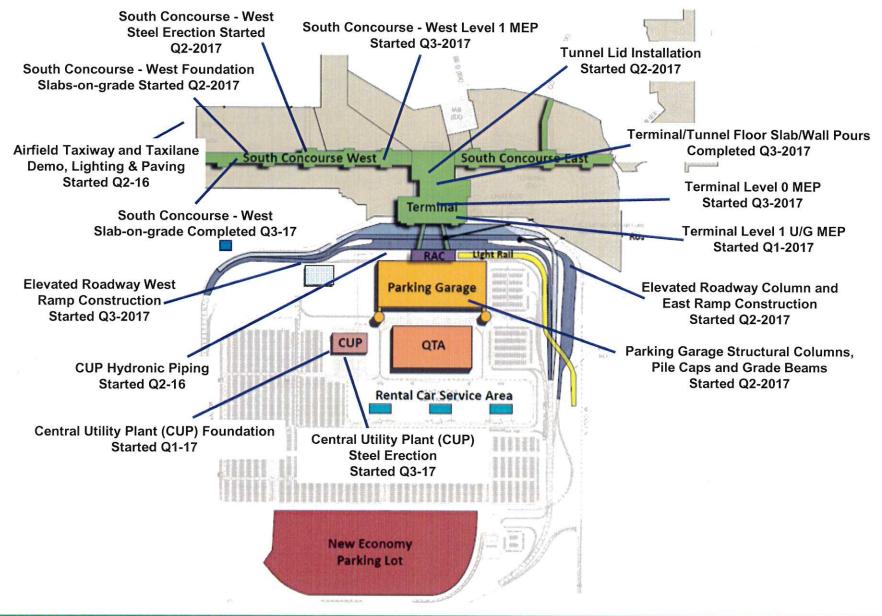

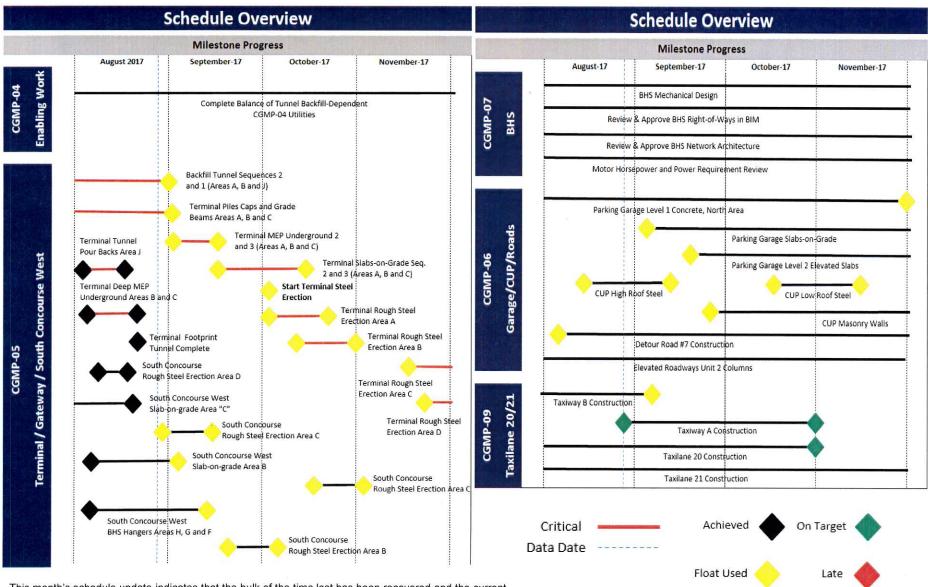

This month's schedule update indicates that the bulk of the time lost has been recovered and the current projection is that the Program is on schedule.

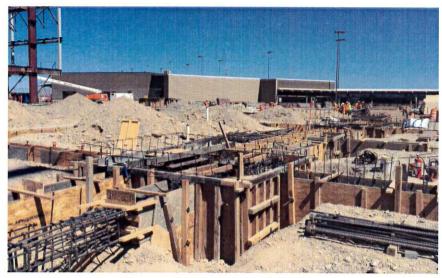

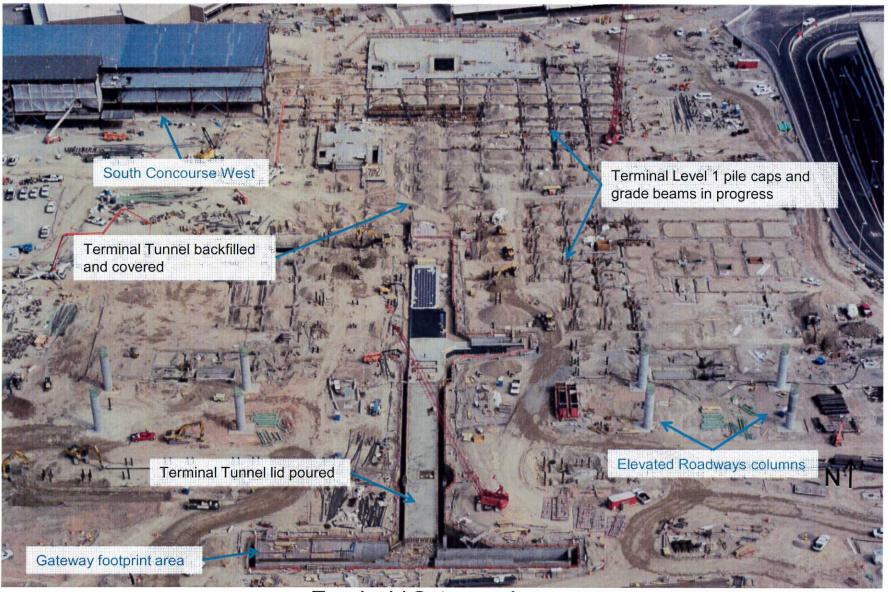

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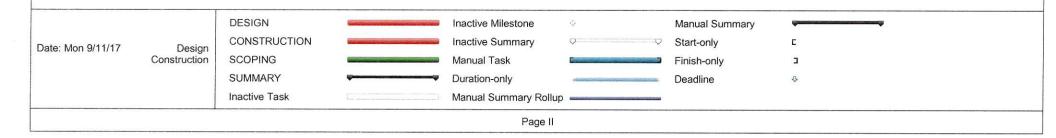

#### **DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION REPORT**

#### **DESIGN/BID/AWARD**

(6) **PCC Joint Seal Program Phase 2** - This project is part of an ongoing program to repair and reseal the joints in the portland cement concrete (PCC) pavement at various locations throughout the airfield. Work will include removal of the existing joint seal material, cleaning of the joints, repairs to spalled or damaged concrete panels along the joints as needed, and resealing the concrete joints. The apparent low bidder for this project is Granite Construction. Contract documents are currently being executed.

#### **CONSTRUCTION**

- (1) Runway 17-35 and Taxiways P & R Pavement Rehabilitation This project is nearing completion. The Contractor is currently working on punch list items.
- (2) Runway 14-32 Pavement Rehabilitation The asphalt paving for this project has been completed. The remaining work includes pavement grooving, re-painting of the runway and installation of in-pavement lights. This work will begin the week of September 18<sup>th</sup> to complete the project.
- (3) **Asphalt Overlay Program Phase 11** The Contractor is paving the final stage for this project along with raising utilities. Substantial completion is anticipated for the week of September 25, 2017.
- (4) North Support Improvements/Vehicle Gate 22 Phase 1A and 1B (UPS dock reconstruction) work has begun. The Contractor is in the process of constructing a new loading dock and relocating the existing security fence and Gate 25.
- (5) **Airfield Signage Replacement** A notice to proceed was issued for this project on August 1, 2017. The Contractor is currently preparing submittals for review by SLCDA Engineering.
- (7) **East Apron Pavement Rehabilitation Phase 1** A notice to proceed was issued for this project on September 11, 2017. The Contractor is currently preparing submittals for review by SLCDA Engineering.
- (8) **2100 North 4000 West Asphalt Overlay** Paving for this project has been completed. The Contractor is updating signs, delineators, and installing crash attenuators.
- (9) **Airport Operations Center** Finish work within the building continues to include painting, ceiling installation and floor finishes and is approximately 98% completed. Furniture for the project is on site and installation has started. Communications cabling work is on-going throughout the project and will continue until the project is complete. Project completion is anticipated for the end of October 2017.
- (10) **Fiber Run 2200 West and 2200 North to North Vault** The Contractor is currently working on Phase 1 of the project installing communication and electrical ductbank north of 2100 North.
- (11) **Lower Concourse B Roof Replacement** The Contractor has completed approximately 60% of the roofing work for this project. Anticipated substantial completion for this project is September 29, 2017.
- (12) **Passenger Boarding Bridge Replacement (C2, D5, and D7)** The first bridge work will begin on Gate D5 on October 3, 2017 with the bridge delivery date of October 6, 2017.
